<p>Guest Presenters</p>	<p><i>SHAC Presentation and Activity: Getting to Know our SHAC, Gigi Rivadeneyra, Mike Weitemann and Kari Brown</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Concept of Coordinated School Health Model originated in 1987, and identified different components that impact health in schools. • CDC expanded on that model with the Whole School, Whole Community, Whole Child (WSCC) Approach, which now serves as framework for coordinating school health services. • WSCC includes the following 10 components: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ <i>Physical education and physical activity.</i> ○ <i>Nutrition environment and services.</i> ○ <i>Health education.</i> ○ <i>Social and emotional climate.</i> ○ <i>Physical environment.</i> ○ <i>Health services.</i> ○ <i>Counseling, psychological, and social services.</i> ○ <i>Employee wellness.</i> ○ <i>Community involvement.</i> ○ <i>Family engagement.</i> • <i>Coordination of these components increases effectiveness of reducing health and social barriers in schools.</i> • <i>The School Health Advisory Committee (SHAC) invites representatives from these 10 areas to promote collaboration and engagement.</i> • <i>SHAC members play an important role sharing resources, recommendations, and providing support for health services coordination.</i> • <i>The Florida Statutes in the School Health Services Act, establish the requirement for Department of Health and School Districts to collaborate in establishing and maintaining a SHAC.</i> • <i>Every 2 years, the School Health Services Plan must be presented to SHAC members for review.</i> <p><u>ACTIVITY:</u> <i>“Knowing our SHAC” facilitated by Kari Brown</i></p>	<p><i>WSCC Model:</i> Whole School, Whole Community, Whole Child (WSCC) Whole School, Whole Community, Whole Child (WSCC) CDC</p>
