SERVICES AND PROGRAMS

Breast and Cervical Cancer

The Florida Breast and Cervical Cancer Early Detection Program in Seminole County provides clinical breast examinations, screening and diagnostic mammogram referrals, and pap tests/HPV screenings to women 40-64 years of age who are uninsured or underinsured Florida residents in Seminole and Lake counties. These women must meet the financial requirement of being at or over 200% of the federal poverty level.

Clinic

The clinic provides walk-in, and appointment-based services designed to support overall health and wellness. Services include family planning, general health assessments and screenings with linkage to care, PrEP services, STI/HIV testing, treatment, and counseling, school physicals, Pap tests, and clinical breast exams with referral and/or linkage to mammogram services.

The Public Health Dental Program’s Sealing Sunny Smiles Across Florida initiative is part of a statewide oral health plan to promote evidence-based prevention strategies to achieve optimal oral health for all Floridians.

The School Based Sealant Program serves Title 1 schools in Seminole County for 2nd and 5th grade students. Our dental hygienist provides preventive services including screenings, oral hygiene education, fluoride varnishes, cleanings, and sealants utilizing portable equipment. Seminole County Government provides financial support to the program for the non-Medicaid clients. In 2024, we served an approximately 10% increase of non-Medicaid insured children.

Diabetes Program

In 2025, the program provided 21 Diabetes Empowerment Education Program classes (with eight or more participants). Classes were conducted in English and Spanish, reaching 120 individuals, an increase of 36 from 2024.

Epidemiology

The Epidemiology Program conducts disease surveillance and investigates suspected occurrences of infectious diseases and conditions reported from health care providers, hospitals, and laboratories.

All practitioners, hospitals, and laboratories in Florida are required to notify the Florida Department of Health of diseases or conditions of public health significance under section 381.0031, Florida Statutes, and Chapter 64D-3, Florida Administrative Code.

Florida Healthy Babies

The Florida Department of Health’s Florida Healthy Babies initiative is a statewide effort to reduce infant mortality. The Maternal Child Health Program provides a wide range of educational topics throughout the year. We use multiple strategies to reach as many community residents as possible. These efforts include partnering with schools, health care providers, childcare centers, and faith-based organizations to ensure families can access information where they live, learn, and gather. By tailoring outreach to the unique needs of each community group, the program strengthens engagement and increases the effectiveness of its educational messages.

New Partnership

The Florida Healthy Babies Program partnered with Mother’s Milk Bank of Florida to establish a breastmilk donation depot onsite at the Florida Department of Health in Seminole County. Milk Bank approved mothers can donate breastmilk to support NICU infants requiring donor milk for optimal health and development. The first donor donated 173 ounces of breast milk.

Water Safety

Seminole County’s water safety initiative distributed a wide range of educational materials and resources throughout the community to promote drowning prevention and safer practices around water.

Early Literacy

Reading4Health initiative promoted early reading habits and strengthened parent/child bonding through outreach in daycares, Little Free Libraries, and Florida Department of Health learning centers, and lobby areas.

- Books were delivered to 15 Little Free Libraries across Seminole County, and a total of 250 books were provided.

Prevent Stillbirth and Promote Healthy Pregnancies

The Florida Healthy Babies Program conducted a media campaign focused on stillbirth prevention and to increase awareness of risk factors, promote healthy pregnancy behaviors, and encourage timely medical care to support healthy outcomes for mothers and babies. Toolkits were created and provided to partners who shared with their clients. A total of 300 kits were provided to faith-based women's organizations, WIC, and the Healthy Start Coalition of Seminole County.

Safe Sleep Practices

The Safe Sleep Practices initiative reached parents, grandparents, daycare staff, faith-based organizations, and community partners throughout Seminole County with education and resources promoting infant health and safety. The Florida Healthy Babies program staff attended the Healthy Start Coalition Annual Baby Shower in April, and the Joy Shower, in September hosted by the Women's Club of Sanford to share education focused on infant mortality risk reduction. The families received education on stillbirth prevention, safe sleeping, importance of breastfeeding initiation, tobacco cessation, and prevention of shaken baby syndrome. The program provided information to 120 families through baby shower events.



Hepatitis Program

A targeted community education program at DOH-Seminole, the Hepatitis Prevention Program provides adult hepatitis A and B immunizations, screening and testing for hepatitis A, B, and C, and treatment referrals for those who test positive.

HIV/AIDS Prevention

DOH-Seminole offers pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP) to anyone 18 or older with a non-reactive HIV Test. PrEP is a single pill taken once daily to prevent HIV infection, if taken as directed.

Throughout 2025, the PrEP program conducted 11 presentations across Seminole County. The presentations were completed at college campuses, advocacy organizations, and provider offices focusing on the prevalence of HIV in Seminole County, prevention options available, and the services provided by the PrEP clinic at DOH-Seminole. A total of 160 members of the community were reached during these presentations.



Immunizations

Each year, from July 15 to August 15, immunization services are conducted for back-to-school needs for students in kindergarten through 12th grade.

Mobile Services

The mobile health units continued to expand access to essential health services, focusing on preventive care, early intervention, and community outreach. This service is a key entry point for individuals who face barriers to traditional health care settings and have limited access to transportation offering affordable, client centered support.

Services provided included on site screenings such as blood pressure, glucose, STI/HIV testing, adult immunizations, family planning, chronic medical condition screenings for diabetes, cholesterol, thyroid disease, prostate disorders, renal function, metabolic issues, and liver function. Education and referrals are also provided.

To ensure services are available to recipients most in need, DOH-Seminole partnered with organizations such as Shepherd’s Hope, Uptown Altamonte (Remington Inn), Rescue Outreach Mission, One Senior Place, Picnic Project, Community Church of God-Geneva, Midway Safe Harbor, Iglesia El Redentor, Iglesias Vida Nueva, Pathways to Care, Bueno Pharmacy, and Hope Helps.

Mobile services strengthened the access to screenings, treatment, and linkage to care by increasing early detection of health conditions, improving access for underserved and high-need populations, enhancing community partnerships, and reducing barriers related to transportation and cost.



Health Promotion and Education

The Office of Health Promotion and Education provides a variety of services to Seminole County residents, along with providing services agency wide and to staff.

IN 2025

- 97 outreach events attended, an increase from 73 in 2024
- 654 doses of naloxone were distributed
- 180 clients were provided with referrals for resources beyond what is offered at DOH-Seminole
- 6 fall prevention training sessions were conducted, educating 62 clients about preventing falls, and case management for clients with additional concerns beyond falls was provided in collaboration with Seminole County Community Health Services
- 93 health education classes were conducted at local schools and senior groups, providing valuable education about nutrition and physical activity
- A variety of presentation and activities were conducted by our Employee Wellness Committee, including Mental Wellness Day, Healthy Cooking Demonstrations, Sip of Sereni-tea, Recess Day, and Staff Health Check-ins

Outreach

During outreach events, DOH-Seminole conducted medical screenings for 531 clients. More than 60% of those clients exhibited hypertension and were given medical devices to self-monitor their blood pressure. Education and resources to help manage this chronic condition was also provided.

Additionally, 371 of the clients also had a glucose screening done. Almost 30% of those clients exhibited elevated glucose numbers. They were provided with a glucose monitor, strips to go with the monitor, lancets, bandages, and alcohol wipes.



Food Pantry

In 2025, our food pantry (named the Stalk Market) served 3,527 families and 5,029 bags of shelf stable food were distributed. On average we served approximately 70 clients each week. The food pantry has served the community since 2019.

The success with the Stalk Market is a direct result of the strong partnerships within the community. We are especially grateful for the continued support of Seminole County Government, whose funding makes the Stalk Market possible. This funding is provided to our community partner, the Sharing Center, which manages the ordering of all shelf-stable food items and coordinates delivery to DOH-Seminole.

Each week DOH-Seminole staff come together to bag and prepare everything for Wednesday distribution. Other partnerships include 4Roots, the charitable arm of 4Rivers, which supplies fresh produce biweekly for our clients and our local Publix, store #0698, donates freshly baked bread and pastries every week. These produce and bakery contributions complement the shelf stable items and help us provide a more complete, nutritious offering to our clients.



DOH-Seminole, in partnership with Unity Youth Association (UYA) and the city of Sanford, hosted the Men's Health Huddle: Shoot Hoops. Smash Myths. Save Lives on September 27, at the Westside Community Center. Men of all ages were invited to learn about prostate cancer and screenings.

Performance and Quality Improvement

The Office of Performance and Quality Improvement monitor the organization's performance management system composed of county health department key performance metrics, customer satisfaction, and foundational organization documents including the Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA), Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP), strategic plan, and quality improvement plan. The office is responsible for fostering a culture of quality improvement and innovation as well as to develop annual reports collecting and monitoring required documentation to adhere to the Public Health Accreditation Board standards and measures.

- Received 2,214 of customer satisfaction surveys showing 42% increase compared to 2024, maintaining a 99% satisfaction rate
- Hosted four Healthy Seminole Collaborative sessions, averaging 48 in attendance, representing an average of 25 organizations per meeting, reporting 85% CHIP items either as completed or on track
- Submitted foundational plan annual reports scoring above 92% alignment with accreditation guidelines
- Provided five quality Improvement and innovation training courses in 14 sessions, with 53 staff in attendance
- Initiated eight quality improvement and innovation projects and completed four



Public Health Preparedness

DOH-Seminole Public Health Preparedness Program ensures the community can respond rapidly and effectively to emergencies through coordinated planning, trained personnel, and reliable operational systems. DOH-Seminole leads local public health and medical coordination under Emergency Support Function 8 (ESF-8), staffing the emergency operations center during activations to provide real-time public health support and resource management.

Workforce readiness is strengthened through continuous training, including specialized instruction for serving individuals with access and functional needs, as well as routine safety code drills that reinforce staff proficiency in emergency procedures. A secure warehouse stocked with personal protective equipment, shelter materials, and point of dispensing (POD) supplies enables rapid deployment of critical resources, while established shelter support and activation capabilities ensure timely protection of the community during public health emergencies. All preparedness plans undergo annual review and revision to integrate lessons learned and best practices, sustaining a high level of readiness across all hazards.

The Public Health Preparedness Program facilitated four sessions on special needs shelter training series for all DOH-Seminole staff to strengthen readiness for shelter activation and operations.



DOH-Seminole participated in 4 full-scale and tabletop exercises including the Region 5 Mass Casualty Full Scale Exercise, Continuity of Operations Planning Functional-Scale Exercise, Emergency Management's Post Impact/Stepdown Shelter Full-Scale Exercise, and a viral outbreak tabletop exercise.

Region 5 Mass Casualty FullScale Exercise on April 10, strengthened regional emergency response readiness. DOH-Seminole staffed the ESF-8 desk at the emergency operations center, providing realtime hospital and emergency department bed counts, logistical coordination, and staffing support to partner agencies. We also served as an evaluator at a participating hospital.

Refugee Health

The Refugee Health Program serves refugees, political asylees, and parolees who have recently immigrated to the U.S. The program provides an initial health history, mental health and physical assessments, conducts a comprehensive laboratory screening for communicable and chronic diseases, provides routine immunizations, and assistance with immigration form validations for those clients seeking to adjust their immigration status.

Clients' county of origin includes Colombia, Cuba, Haiti, Ukraine, and Venezuela.

School Health Program

During the 2024-25 school year, the School Health Program and Seminole County Public Schools collaborated to offer over 43,200 screening services to students in Seminole County public schools. Screening services included vision, hearing, scoliosis, oral health, and growth and development. Over 3,400 students were referred for follow-up. The team also participated more than 30 community outreach and educational activities.



As part of a comprehensive school health approach, the School Health Advisory Committee, met quarterly to share resources in the areas of student wellness, epilepsy, substance use prevention, pediatric infectious disease, youth mental health, oral health, and human trafficking, among others.

The committee is a collaboration between DOH- Seminole and Seminole County Public Schools and includes over 30 active members representing 10 different components that impact school health, including school safety, mental and social health, physical environment, nutrition, physical activity, health services, community and family engagement, and health education.

Sexually Transmitted Infections

Confidential services are provided to anyone who seeks care for the prevention of Sexually transmitted infections (STI). The STI program’s disease intervention specialists participate in education, and community health activities throughout the year providing free testing and prevention education. Collaborating across county borders, staff monitor the number of syphilis, HIV, gonorrhea, and chlamydia cases reported, and coordinate appropriate response support.

Positive Youth Development

DOH-Seminole's Positive Youth Development Program served over 550 youth in grades 5th through 12th, over nine different sites. The program supports youth health competencies by delivering facilitated engaging workshops in a safe environment and participating in community service activities. The workshops address topics such as social media safety, understanding and managing emotions, communication, assertiveness, healthy relationships, understanding your skills, knowing your values, among others.

Youth facilitators hosted more than 200 workshops through the year with various collaborating sites and organizations, including 21st Century After School Program, Boys and Girls Clubs in Sanford, Impower the

Grove Village, Juvenile Justice Center, City of Sanford Triplet Center, YMCA Leadership Oviedo, Eugene Gregory Memorial Youth Academy, Antioch Missionary Baptist Church, Seminole Prevention Coalition, U.S. Army National Guard, Outreach Rescue Mission, Meals on Wheels, Central Florida GROW, Tobacco Free Partnership, and local veteran's posts and senior centers.

- The youth contributed over 1,230 hours of combined community service hours.

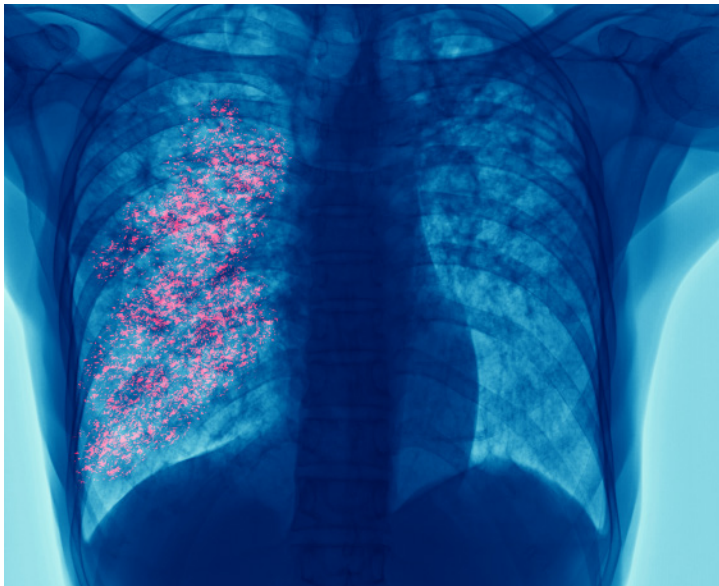


Tobacco Prevention

The Tobacco prevention and cessation team completed 31 referrals to the Area Health Educator Center (AHEC) to participate in Tobacco Free Florida's Quit Your Way program, receiving free tools and resources to Floridians ready to quit tobacco.

IN 2025

- Provided 29 clients with nicotine replacement therapy (controlled doses of nicotine without the additional harmful chemicals in tobacco, assisting in alleviating withdrawal symptoms and cravings)



Tuberculosis

The Tuberculosis (TB) Program provides TB skin testing, chest x-ray referrals, medications and investigation of active cases. Other services include directly observed therapy, nurse case management and expert medical management for current cases, suspects of active TB disease and latent TB infection.

IN 2025

- 5 reported TB cases in Seminole County during 2025, two more than reported in 2024

Vital Statistics

The Florida Department of Health in Seminole County's Vital Statistics Office provides official records for births and deaths in Florida. Vital Statistics has continued the partnership with the Seminole County Tax Collector to issue certified copies of Florida birth certificates in participating offices.

Woman, Infants, and Children (WIC)

WIC is a federally-funded nutrition program for women, infants and children. Eligible clients can receive healthy foods, nutrition education and counseling, breastfeeding support, and referrals for health care and community services at no cost, at Sanford and Casselberry DOH-Seminole locations.

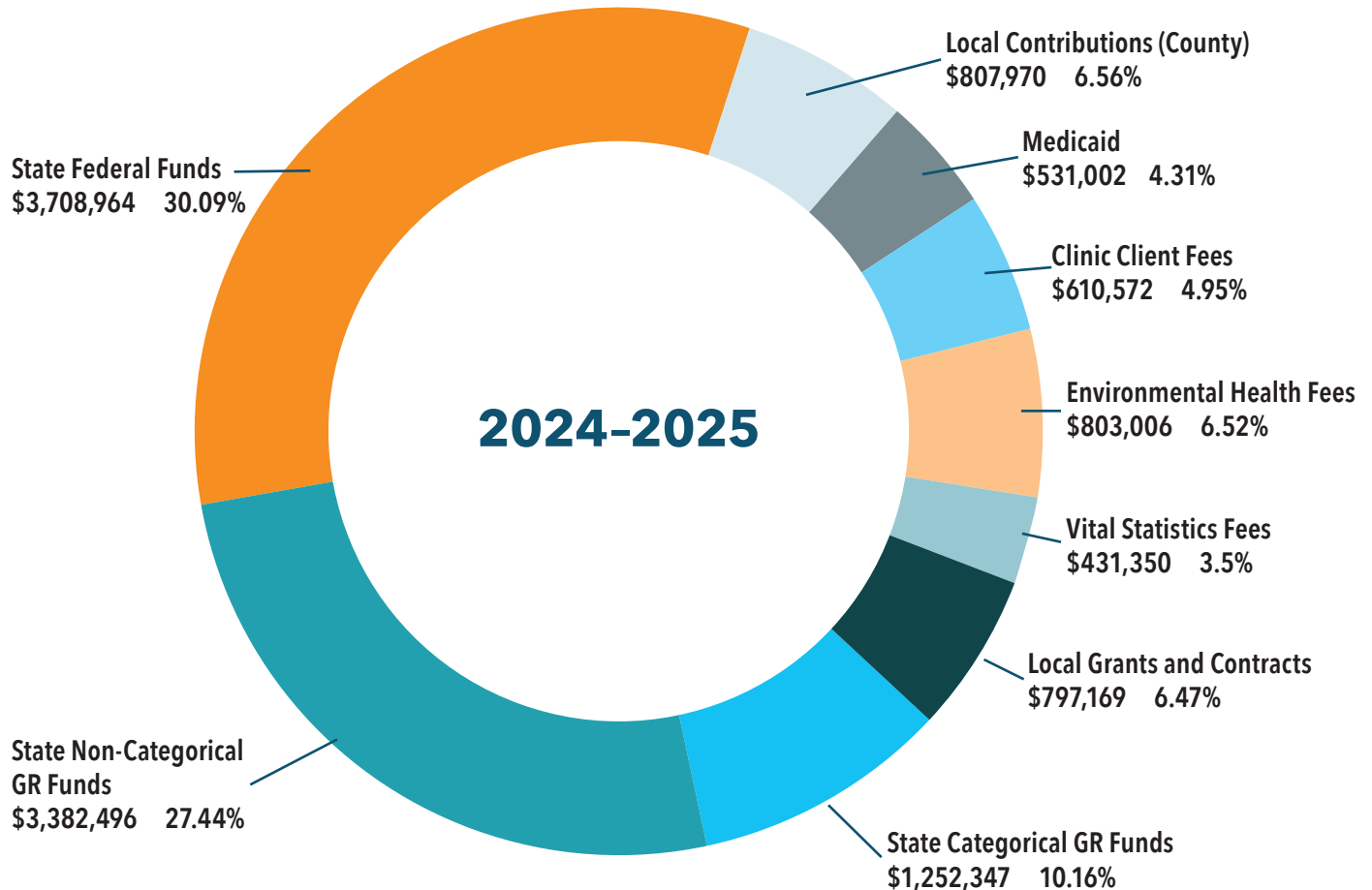

SUCCESSES AND ACCOMPLISHMENTS



Gloria "Gigi" Rivadeneyra, school health manager, was recognized with the President's Award of Excellence 2025 during the Florida School Health Association Conference.

Christina Milian graduated from the Public Health Executive Leadership Program on May 8. This ongoing leadership development initiative equips rising public health leaders with knowledge and skills to lead in public health care.





Dr. Ethan Johnson, health officer and administrator, graduated from Leadership Seminole's Class 34 on May 9, 2025.

During Revive Awareness Day, held on June 6, Dr. Ethan Johnson, along with community partners, provided education on naloxone, hands-only CPR, Seminole County Government opioid settlement mitigation efforts, and community resources to support individuals with substance use disorder.





DOH-Seminole's WIC Program was among the six counties across the state to receive the WIC Breastfeeding Premiere Award. This award reflects heartfelt commitment to increasing breastfeeding initiation and duration rates among WIC participants, highlighting the outstanding work from staff. On September 12, our WIC Program proudly received the award, presented by Ericka Moore, breastfeeding training coordinator from Florida's State WIC Office.

On August 28, the ESOL program team received the promising practice certificate awarded by the National Association of County and City Health Officials (NACCHO). After a rigorous peer-evaluation process by NACCHO's workgroup members, the program demonstrated exemplary and replicable initiative in response to a local public health need and the positive impact local health departments can have on our communities.

Seminole State College, Seminole State Commits, and DOH-Seminole collaborated to host English classes. In 2025, a total of 5 cohorts participated in classes. Since its inception in 2024, an average of 31 students were recruited per cohort, with a 69.3% retention rate.
